Research a key element of the Care Alliance Ireland (CAI) Strategic Plan for 2014-2017

- Priority 3 of 4: "Supporting primary and applied research on Family Caring and the role of Family Carers."
- CAI aim to be thought leaders in family carer issues, and to act as a connector in the sector
- Focus on bridging research-policy-practice gap

Multiple aspects of CAI research

- Primary Qualitative & Quantitative research
- Literature reviews/ desk research
- Collaborations with other not for profit organisations, state organisations & Universities
- Collation of Research/Current Policy and Services Overview Report on Family Caring in Ireland. (March 2015)
- Dissemination (detailed later)

Primary Research- Examples

- Carers Week survey March 2015- ~800 Reponses- valuable insights re: carer attitudes and experiences- both qualitative and quantitative
- Health and Well-being of Family Carers in Ireland: Results of a survey of recipients of the Carer's Allowance (2008) (quantitative)

Collaborations with other groups & Universities

- Benefit Findings for Carers (Ongoing, with University of Limerick)
- Between Worlds: The Experiences and Needs of Former Family Carers (2011, with Trinity College Dublin)
- Together for Young Adult Carers (TOYAC) (2013, with other NGO's based around Europe)
- A number of collaborative research bids are currently under consideration for funding (EU, NDA, HRB)
- Other Carer/Condition Specific Organisations Research- limited collaboration todate (The Carers Association, The Alzheimer Society)
