#### Publication of National Carers' Strategy

July 19th 2012, marked the publication of the first ever National Carers' Strategy by the government. Care Alliance Ireland considers this a significant milestone in advocacy for and in recognition of Family Carers in Ireland.



The vision statement says:

'Carers will be recognised and respected as key care partners. They will be supported to maintain their own health and well-being and to care with confidence. They will be empowered to participate as fully as possible in economic and social life.'

## National Carers' Strategy

The Strategy identifies three principles, namely; recognition, support and empowerment, and also sets out high level goals and objectives. The 4 national goals are to:

- Recognise the value and contribution of carers and promote their inclusion in decisions relating to the person that they are caring for
- Support carers to manage their physical, mental and emotional health and well-being
- Support carers to care with confidence through the provision of adequate information, training, services and supports
- Empower carers to participate as fully as possible in economic and social life

We, alongside other carer organisations, have welcomed the publication of this strategy. Carers organisations worked closely in reviewing drafts of this strategy earlier in the year and can report that many of our key suggestions were taken on board in the final report. Thank you to our other member organisations for their input into this process.

Whilst we believe that it is weak in some areas, noticeably it offers no guarantee to fully protect current income supports, or no firm commitment to the right to carer assessments, the Strategy does set out a future roadmap for better recognition and supports for Family Carers into the future. Importantly, it outlines which department is responsible for implementing each action and over what timeframe.

We in Care Alliance Ireland are currently reviewing each commitment given in the Strategy and intend to put together our own review and monitoring process, to ensure maximum impact into the future.

## Irish Hospice Foundation

Seminar for Carers - Working with families facing death and bereavement: Addressing the needs of carers employed by care organisations

Providing timely support and information is vital to ensure that family carers can feel competent and confident, as they share in the illness experience of the person they are caring for and undertake vital care tasks to support the person on a day to day basis. This support and information becomes particularly significant as the person they are caring for approaches the last phase of their life. In response to this the Irish Hospice Foundation held a workshop in May 2012 entitled:



Working with families facing death and bereavement: Addressing the needs of carers employed by care organisations

Nineteen participants attended the workshop, and they represented disease specific and carers' organisations, those providing residential care and private home care agencies. The workshop sought to build confidence for the participants in working with families and healthcare staff involved in delivering care at end of life. It also aimed to help participants to explore their own experiences and views of dying, death and bereavement, touching on multicultural experiences of the carer themselves. The workshop facilitators – Amanda Savrou (Senior Medical Social Worker from Marymount Hospice Cork) and Elizabeth Coogan (Psychosocial/Bereavement Care Co-ordinator Palliative Care Drogheda), used interactive and experiential learning techniques during the workshop session to maximise the learning experiences of the participants. The feedback from the participants was very positive, and they suggested that there should be more training available on this topic.

# Co Roscommon Disability Support Group

Co Roscommon Disability Support Group also known as RSG, Derrane, Co Roscommon is one of 24 organisations nationally who have been awarded the tender to provide Home Care Services under the HSE Enhanced Home Care Package Scheme.

RSG, founded in 1989, is a HSE preferred provider and has a proven track record in delivering HSE funded care services to people with disabilities and older people. These services are provided in the community, workplace and socially in Co Roscommon. RSG expects within the next few months to create 20 jobs for care workers who are FETAC level 5 qualified or in the process of completing a FETAC Level 5 qualification. Fetac training takes place on an ongoing in the adjoining FETAC accredited Flexible Learning College. A broad range of courses and training is available at the college. In 2010 they set up RSG 24/7 Care providing a professional 24 hour care service countywide and in surrounding areas. They have a range of other services available, specifically chiropody, counselling, computer training to people of mixed abilities.



# Review of Domiciliary Care Allowance - Terms of Reference Published

We welcome the review of this scheme and note the terms of reference have now been published and that invitations for submissions have been made. We shall be monitoring progress closely and offer any support we can to those directly involved in this review.

#### Terms of Reference

- 1. Examine and report on the policy objectives and legal provisions underpinning the DCA scheme;
- 2. Review the current administrative, medical assessment and appeals processes underpinning the scheme, including an examination of the duration of review periods for the scheme based on the medical condition of the children involved and taking account of other priority demands on the medical resources of the Department;
- 3. Review the Medical Guidelines and the Report of Expert Medical Group having regard to the 3 years operational experience since they were introduced;
- 4. Liaise with the Advisory Group on Tax and Welfare in the context of their review of DA/DCA issues and incorporate any relevant findings into the administrative arrangements for the DCA scheme:
- 5. In light of the foregoing, consider whether any legislative changes are required in relation to the scheme and whether the current administrative, medical assessment and appeals processes need further refinement to meet the overall policy objectives of the scheme; and
- 6. Make recommendations to the Minister for Social Protection by end December 2012 on the basis of these findings.

As part of the review, a consultation process with parents and representative groups will be held.

#### Composition of the Review Group

The group will be chaired by Ms Sylda Langford, and comprise representatives from the Department of Social Protection, other relevant Departments/public bodies, experts with relevant experience in the area and parent/advocacy group representatives.

Downs Syndrome Ireland, Inclusion Ireland, Irish Autism Action, the Special Needs Parents Association, the Carers Association and the Midlands Regional Forum of People with Disabilities are the organisations invited to represent the issues to the review group.

## Census Figures Show Increase in Carers

The recently published figures from the 2011 Census show that 183,000 people aged 15 and over reported providing care. This represents a 14% increase on the 2006 figures,

The question was asked of children aged 14 and under as well as adults, and secondly respondents were asked to write in the number of hours spent caring rather than select from set categories. The results show that for those aged 15 or over the total number of carers increased by 21,967 from 160,917 to 182,884. In addition there were 4,228 carers under the age of 15 bringing the total number of carers to 187,112, or 4.1 per cent of the population.



While female carers continued to outnumber male carers (114,113 and 72,999 respectively) the number of male carers showed the larger increase rising, by 20 per cent since 2006.

## Caring from Afar

Providing care for an elderly parent or ageing relative takes a lot of love, patience and compassion. Having many miles between you and your loved one creates a whole new list of complications and stressful situations may arise. This seminar will focus on strategies for identifying when help is needed, what you can do from afar, how to involve other family members, what resources are available, and discussions of other legal and financial matters involved in caring for an ageing relative.

## 12 Steps in Caregiving

- 1. Although I cannot control the disease process, I need to remember I can control many aspects of how it affects my relative.
- 2. I need to take care of myself so that I can continue doing the things that are most important.
- 3. I need to simplify my lifestyle so that my time and energy are available for things that are really important at this time.
- 4. I need to cultivate the gift of allowing others to help me, because caring for my relative is too big a job to be done by one person.
- 5. I need to take one day at a time rather than worry about what may or may not happen in the future.
- 6. I need to structure my day because a consistent schedule makes life easier for me and my relative.
- 7. I need to have a sense of humor because laughter helps to put things in a more positive perspective.
- 8. I need to remember that my relative is not being difficult on purpose; rather that his/her behavior and emotions are distorted by the illness.
- 9. I need to focus on and enjoy what my relative can still do rather than constantly lament over what is gone.
- 10. I need to increasingly depend upon other relationships for love and support.
- 11. I need to frequently remind myself that I am doing the best that I can at this very moment.
- 12. I need to draw upon the Higher Power, which I believe is available to me.

## Home Adaptations Save Money

The UK government estimates that 568,000 people currently require an adaptation to their home. If this need was met, according to recent LSE research, a saving of £625 million on social care would be made. Their study looked at both quantitative savings, in terms of reduced falls, hospital stays and operations required following accidents in the home; and qualitative benefits, in terms of better quality of life and confidence.

# Assessing Family Caregiver Needs: Policy and Practice Considerations

This short report published by the AARP Public Policy Institute in the USA explains the fundamental principles of caregiver assessment and why assessments have an important role in a high-performing health and social care system.

'Caregiver assessment is a systematic process of gathering information about a caregiving situation to identify the specific problems, needs, strengths, and resources of the family caregiver, as well as the ability of the caregiver to contribute to the needs of the care recipient. Effectively assessing and addressing caregiver needs can maintain the health and well-being of caregivers, sustain their ability to provide care, prevent or postpone nursing home placement, and produce better outcomes for the care recipient.'
